Legislation across all jurisdictions – placement hierarchy

<u>2012 Review</u> found > one dimensional interpretation > application only after removal decision > inconsistent with the intent > identification of 5 constituent elements of the ATSICPP

2015 – Adopted as national policy position under the National Framework for Protecting Australia's Children 3rd Action Plan

2016 – QLD becomes first jurisdiction to legislate all 5 elements, applied to all significant decisions

2017-2020 <u>Active Efforts (ie purposeful, timely and thorough) introduced as legislated standard, and paramount principle amended to reflect the enduring nature and obligations regarding <u>Best Interests (ie not just at a point in time but for the duration of the child's life)</u></u>



ATSICPP

The ATSICPP is the key legislative and operational safeguard for the rights, including distinct cultural rights, of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children and young people who are involved with, or at risk of entering the statutory child protection system.
