





The importance of a legal identity

The right to a legal existence is the first right for every human being and is concretely embodied by the birth certificate, which establishes the child's name and affiliation. Birth registration provides an important layer of protection for a child, which marks acknowledgement of a child's existence and identity. Enshrined in the Convention on the Rights of the Child (Articles 7 and 8), and the African Charter on the Rights and Welfare of the Child (Article 6), the right to be recognised as a person before the law is a critical step in ensuring lifelong protection and may be a prerequisite for children's ability to claim other rights.

In Cameroon, UNICEF works with the Government in the following frames:

Cooperation framework plan between UN/UNICEF and the government

Evaluation of Birth registration in 2021-2022



Birth Certificate is a key to:

- Identification, citizenship and facilitating administrative procedures.
- 2. Access to legal rights: such as the right to education, health and social protection.
- 3. Prevention of violence: child labour, early marriage, illegal registration in the armed forces, imprisonment in the justice system.
- **Preventing** statelessness.
- **Demographic statistics:** essential for government planning, political decision-making, resource management, etc.

For a country, a region, a district, a municipality, legal identity of children and citizen:

Offers a better control of demographic data and better programming to meet the composition and needs of the population (health, education, water, etc.).

Planning, investments and monitoring are better controlled.





Campaign Goals

Making Cameroon a continental champion for child access to a legal identity

Make 2024 the Year of Birth **Registration** by strengthening the local civil registration system to accelerate universal birth registration for children..

Decentralization, interoperability, digitalization)

Engaging Mayors and local partners including, civil registry officers, judges and traditional leaders for universal birth registration in Cameroon.





Expected Results

A Charter of Mayors on their commitment to speeding up the birth registration timetable has been signed by 100% of Mayors.

A roadmap for implementing the Charter has been implemented.

The foundations have been laid for greater interoperability and intersectorality between the civil registry and sectoral services, health, education, etc.

Mobilization and engagement of municipalities and other **stakeholders** to promote the birth registration agenda at decentralized level.

Reduction in the number of children without birth registration in schools.

Increase birth registration for children under five by strengthening the local CRVS system using the interoperability, digitalization, coordination and multisectorality of services as key strategies.





The Mayors' Challenge: An Opportunity to operationalize the commitments of the Mayors Charpter and Roadmap

INDICATORS

- 1- Municipalities that have submitted monthly data/Statistics on CRVS to the BUNEC
- 2- Municipalities with a budgeted action plan for the implementation of the Mayors Charter
- 3- Functional civil registration offices in health facilities in the municipalities
- 4- Existence of an Integrated Civil Registry Management System (SIGEC) interoperable with DHIS2
- 5- Existence of functional concertation platform/framework for issuing birth certificates in the municipality
- 6- Number of school children's files who do not have birth certificate compiled
- 7- Number of community birth registration notebooks discharged by community health workers to register birth in communities





Activation and Main phases

27 April 2024: 1st Mayors' Forum: - ALL MAYORS OF CAMEROON **Signature of the Mayors Charter and Roadmap** Official launch of the MY NAME Campaign

May 2024: A letter from the UNICEF representative addressed to all mayors, inviting them to join the campaign.

May 2024: Start of registrations, appointment of focal points by Mayors, and bilateral contacts with each of them to support the

online registration process.

Juin 2024: Coordination meeting with BUNEC agency heads and technical and financial partners.

July 2024: Implementation of interventions in all municipalities and follow-up missions.

November 2024: training the Mayors on the indicators (drawing up the Micro plan)


Janvier 2025: Coordination Meeting. Evaluation of the campaign's implementation status.


March 2025: Closing of the Campaign. Evaluation of results.





Highlights of the Campaign

Main Challenges

- Late inscription
- Difficulty contacting Mayors
- ✓ Mayors find it difficult to explore the Champaigne website.
- ✓ Poor understanding of reporting methodology
- ✓ Irregular data transmission
- ✓ Mayors found it difficult to report because of the password issues
- ✓ Poor quality data for the indicator of birth registration in schools.
- ✓ Lack of knowledge of the campaign regulations
- ✓ The CRVS remains underfunded, with limited budget allocations at the local level. Inequity in access to funds. Some regions more funded than others.
- ✓ Implementation in crisis areas (natural disaster and the NW/SW crisis)



Opportunities

- Leadership and political engagement at the highest level of the state
- Leadership, Engagement and support of governors in some regions
- Passing of the New Civil Registration Law No. 2024/016 (2024): Includes digitization and simplification of procedures for vulnerable populations.
- New Strategic Plan on CRVS (2025-2029):
- Engagement with University-based Child Rights Centers (Yaounde 2 and NASLA): Using them as platforms to sustain and scale up training and capacity building interventions for mayors and local actors.
- Partnership with International NGO CHIP: Providing technical assistance, including capacity building for partners on birth registration and research





Opportunities

- Partnership/engagement with FEICOM: availability of funds versus integrating civil registration infrastructure into municipalities' investment development plans.
- **Partnerships:**

with World Bank: Ensuring the availability of resources for organizing the special operation. with MINPROFF: Availability of funds for birth registration of vulnerable groups, particularly women with GIZ, UNICEF, and Vital Strategies: To improve the CRVS statistics system.

- **UNICEF** initiative concerning child-friendly communities.
- The JEICOM event in June will be an opportunity to mobilize municipalities and engage strategic partnerships for children's rights, particularly civil registration at the decentralized level.
- Study on Catch-up Birth Registration Special Operation in Schools: Established a multisectoral group on birth registration and education on makes recommendations on: i) Interoperability between the education and civil registry sectors. ii) Creation of a mechanism to prevent unregistered children in schools. iii) Birth registration in crisis contexts.
